Dear Friends in Christ,

As the lights of Christmas fade and give way to the light of that star of Epiphany we turn from birth and new beginnings to journeys and following *The Way*. In Epiphany we consider the moments when those around Jesus came to understand who he was and why he matters. Starting with the magi journeying from afar, to the baptism and the voice from heaven claiming him as beloved, to stories of water changing into wine, the blind seeing, and life bursting forth Epiphany brings us along for us to come and see.

It is tempting to see each as “aha” moments of transformation, yet the Bible more often paints a picture of people gradually understanding and then following. In the time of Jesus people clamored for yet one more sign, one more miracle that they might believe, yet Jesus knew that faith is a constant work in progress, a slow and gradual turning of the heart. So, he showed them the way and set them off in the right direction. In the time of Jonathan Edwards, people clamored to the Great Awakening revivals where the emotion of the moment led to conversions to faith, yet Edwards knew that when the lights faded often so did those conversions. So he committed himself to nurturing new-found until it found the way and followed.

In our time, our tradition emphasizes the “how” of belief even more than the “what.” We remember that it is an ongoing daily process of setting out in the direction of light and truth until it becomes part of who we are. Henry David Thoreau captured that truth when he wrote “As a single footstep will not make a path on the earth, so a single thought will not make a pathway in the mind. To make a deep physical path, we walk again and again. To make a deep mental path, we must think over and over the kind of thoughts we wish to dominate our lives.”

Each day is a new opportunity for us to put us in the right position to continue in that process. How do you start your day?

A few weeks ago, Jon made me aware of how I start my day and how it wasn’t putting me in the right position and so I have begun to change.

I used to listen to Morning Edition on NPR. While there were always stories of interest and truth, there also was the conflict, controversy and the scandal of our time baked in. My act of preparation for the day loaded me down with all that baggage and risked directing me to a different path than the one Jesus invites us to follow. I am now trying out some different podcasts. I love *On Being* with Krista Tippett and her conversations with people of faith. When I have less time, I have discovered the compelling inter-faith stories of the BBC’s *Heart and Soul*. Jon is urging me to listen to the Ezra Klein podcasts for thoughtful exploration of topics that matter.



I Have learned that when I start my day immersed in honest, thoughtful, and hopeful perspectives I find myself making that path Thoreau wrote about, seeing that light the Magi followed, and more intentionally looking for that path Jesus has already deeply made.

As we turn to Epiphany, how are you starting your day? Are you putting yourself in position to set out like the Magi knowing that you too might come home by a different road? Are you searching for the deep path of meaning Christ followed knowing where they lead; to the costs and joys of discipleship? If so, I would love to hear more. If not, what changes could you make?

While Brent is away, we are blessed with wonderful worship leaders.



Matthew Studies Wrap Up


This fall two different groups worked through a fourteen section study on the Gospel of Matthew. We studied Matthew this fall as starting in Advent, Matthew will be the Gospel the Lectionary supplies for worship most often for the coming year.

We started by studying the context of the religious environment of Matthew's time as well as the political dimensions to better understand the issues at hand. The curriculum kept challenging us to focus on Matthew's claims about Jesus and letting them stand alone rather than blending in the insights of Mark, Luke or John. It also drew our attention to those places where Matthew included something not included in any of the other Gospels and asking us to consider why and to what end. Matthew's Gospel can be challenging and yet staying within his framework and perspective we were able to gain new insights and see truth even in some of the most difficult or vexing passages. Many people in the study commented on they noticed things in the Gospel they had never seen before. Some went so far to say that Matthew had become their favorite Gospel. Even more importantly one person even said that through this study they felt like they really met Jesus for the first time.

Each section ended with a celebration including a grand feast for the evening group. While people were deeply grateful for their better understand of this gospel, everyone talked about the joy of being together and exploring these texts in supporting and deep ways. Talk to someone from the class to find out more so that the next time a study starts you might step forward and say me too!
