## December 2020 Newsletter

Dear Friends in Christ,

There is an unmistakable element of surprise that is inherent in Christmas. Presents thoughtfully selected, wrapped up in beautiful packaging, their contents unknown until opening. We go to sleep one night and the next morning wake up to a sense of anticipation and newness – a rush of footsteps on the stairs, shouts of excitement in the air, a sudden jolt of energy to get up and discover what is waiting.

I promise you that no matter how good you are this year at selecting or wrapping; no matter how good you are at decorating or conspiring, you will not achieve the level of stunning surprise unleashed that first Christmas in that sleepy little town of David under the gentle brightness of an unfamiliar star. From shepherds to royalty, from magi to innkeepers something akin to complete and utter astonishment would have been felt on that night leading to ripples still being felt today in places of poverty and power, among wise ones and simple folk just trying to make their way.

Over time we have made Christmas more elaborate and less surprising. We have extended decorations from tiny packages of love to extend throughout the house. Traditions have formed and solidified about everything from what music we listen to, to who gathers together, to what foods are on the table, and to how gifts are opened and what happens for the rest of the day. We schedule church on Christmas Eve and carefully cultivate the rhythms of Christmas day. We routinize what once was a day of utter shock and wonder; a day so full of new sights, sounds, smells, and understanding that Mary in all of her humble wisdom was drawn to simply “ponder these things in her heart.”

This year our carefully laid plans and traditions are threatened by the stresses and change of pandemic and politic. It will not be easy, emotionally or logistically, yet that there is great possibility. This year, things may be far enough beyond the norm or our control that

we need to give in and simply let what unfolds surprise. Don't try to make this Christmas *normal*, let go of what you think you understand about the meaning of this day, and instead allow the utter astonishment of Christmas to re-enter your imagination. Stand beside Mary and Joseph, journey with the shepherds and the magi, listen to the angels sing, let the power of love challenge any sense of power you hold or see running amok in the world. Let go that the gift that God offers in and through Jesus might refocus your heart on what matters, your mind on what is possible, and your life as to your calling and purpose.

The church is re-imagining how we experience both the sacred time of waiting in Advent as well as how Christmas unfolds too. There is much more about that throughout this newsletter. We hope that these new experiences will awaken and offer surprise. There is a beautiful new hymn written by John Bell and Graham Maule called *Who Would Thing That What Was Needed*. I offer the first two verses in closing:

Who would thing that what was needed  
to transform and save the earth  
Might not be a plan or army  
proud in purpose, proved in worth?  
Who would think despite derision,  
that a child should lead the way?  
God surprises earth with heaven,  
coming here on Christmas day.

Shepherds watch and sages wonder,  
monarchs scorn and angels sing;  
Such a place as none would reckon  
hosts a holy, helpless thing;  
Stabled beasts and passing strangers  
watch a baby laid in hay:  
God surprises earth with heaven,  
coming here on Christmas day.

## Two Notes on Year-End Giving

1. We hope you will be able to complete your 2020 giving in December. However, if we receive any check dated in Dec. 2020 by Jan. 15 it can be included in your 2020 giving report, which you will receive before the end of January.
2. If you are over 70 1/2 and have an IRA, you can direct a payment from that IRA to go directly to a charity (like the church) and the amount of the gift will not count as a taxable distribution, as it otherwise would. Thus, one gets the benefit of a charitable deduction (in the form of reduced taxes on IRA distributions) without itemizing. One can use the IRA required minimum distribution (RMD) for this purpose. This information was provided by one of the members of the church, who suggests that if this may apply to you, you should contact your tax advisor or check out IRS Publication 590-B.

## 2021 Pledges:

If you have not yet turned in a 2021 pledge card, or sent an email to Will or Ron, please do that as soon as possible. It's even helpful to know if you decide not to pledge in 2021 even though you did in 2020. A pledge helps the church community and our outreach programs in many ways. But mostly, we value YOU. A pledge is icing on your cake.

## Giving Envelopes

Giving envelopes for 2021 will be assigned to all who used envelopes this year, unless you let Ron know that you don't want them. If you have not used envelopes before but would like to, let Ron know that, and please specify if you want monthly or weekly envelopes. Remember, although you may be

giving monthly now, sometime next year we hope we can renew some form of weekly worship in-person in the sanctuary. But any envelopes can be used throughout the year.

If you can, please pick up your envelopes at the church. They will be available in the office after December 1, just inside the rear door on the hallway counter. The Deacons have been working with Pastor Brent to help design and develop a new way to celebrate Advent and Christmas within the restrictions of COVID safety. We're excited about the plan, hope you will enjoy it, and encourage you to participate in the services fully—by helping to decorate trees at home and at church, by watching the livestream each week of Advent (which starts early this year, on November 29!), by driving by the church during December to see the “hugest” Advent Wreath in progress, and exploring the labyrinth that structures the wreath and “holds” the Candle-Trees.

We hope that you will connect your home celebration with the church celebration, not only have matching ornaments, but also light an Advent Wreath at home, sing loudly the hymns and carols that Noah will play on Sundays, and listen to and reread the Bible stories about angels, shepherds, animals, parents and newborn baby—and then the Magi from the east. We believe that our weekly focus on the meaning of Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy will buoy us all in the dark nights and cold days of December.

## Advent and Christmas Plans

Advent and Christmas are gathered seasons – we come together to do all sorts of things in anticipation and celebration of the coming of the Christ Child. Perhaps more than any other time of the year, Advent and Christmas are filled with traditions that stretch back as far as anyone can imagine. This year we know is and will be very different.

A large group of folks here at the church have been engaged in imagining and wondering. We have endeavored to let go of what has always been long enough to allow something new, yet very familiar to emerge. There are a few pieces of our approach that we want to share:

- We will be intentionally bridging the distance between the church and your home and between each of our homes – bringing elements to Sunday worship from people’s homes while also sending things from the church to engage you while at home.
- We will be focusing intensely on the four themes of Advent: hope, peace, joy, and love.
- We will be sending out an electronic weekly devotional on each of those themes. For those who need a printed copy we will have them here in the office.
- We will be sharing ways to help you get out – get out of your worries, get out of your homes (where possible) and get out of any ruts, fears, or worries that hold you.



A centerpiece of this approach will be our joint creation of a giant (think 54 feet in diameter) advent wreath on the church lawn. We have been partnering with a number of merchants including Windy Hill Farm, Wards, and Comalli Electric to lay out a design that stretches from the walk-way in front of the church to the edge of the tree lines. The candles will be formed from large trees adorned with purple lights (and of course one with pink for joy) while the Christ candle in the center will be an even larger tree decked out in white lights. As the season of Advent progresses, we will light the trees even as we light the candles in worship. On Christmas Eve we will light the large tree as part of our worship. Thanks to the Deacons, Christian Education, Trustees, Growth and Fellowship, as well as Sarah and Michael Deegan for bringing the project to life and light. Here is what we ask of you:

- In this packet you will find four sheets of waterproof paper. We ask you to help us decorate those trees by decorating these ornaments. You can color them, write a prayer on them, offer a quote or anything that you think brings the particular theme to life.
- We invite you to attend streamed worship on Sunday as we explore each of the themes and then to make your ornament later on that Sabbath day with whatever inspiration comes your way. Full instructions, including the date by which they should be returned to the church are on each sheet. Questions – give the office a call.
- We are including a second ornament for each theme so that you can decorate one for your home/tree too.
  - Come to the wreath to walk through the wreath, see the ornaments, take a gift home with you, and let the season fully come to you. The lights on the trees will go on each evening at 5:00 p.m. and remain on until 9:30 p.m. More information about Christmas Eve worship will be forthcoming soon. The Website will be a great source of information for this season which will be very different and yet is about the same thing – God’s great inbreaking of love that changes the world in most unexpected ways. Come and See!
