

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## May 2021 Newsletter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May is always a season of great change in the Berkshires. The natural landscape changes as greens in multitudes of shapes and hues burst forth on the hillsides. There is a change of pace as visitors flock to absorb many of the blessings we enjoy every day. Various institutions in the area find greater life in anticipation of and preparation for the summer that is drawing ever nearer. Energy and emotion swell as we begin to do those things we love.

This year there will be an additional layer of change for all those things and for the church too as we emerge from this past year of pandemic. In that layer additional energy and emotion will certainly be present in both joyful and stressful ways.

The Regathering Committee has affirmed a plan to begin more in person worship, including adding outdoor worship on the second and fourth Sundays and pursuing ways to invite groups of people into the sanctuary for other weeks. We will continue to livestream Sunday services whether indoors or out. The tent is going up which will allow some meetings, classes, and other things to gather outdoors. We are planning a second, simple outdoor service. We are beginning to plan for the fall in the hopes that even more robust activity and connection are possible.

In my conversations with our church family there are some who are anxious to resume quickly and others anxious to avoid doing so too quickly. There are some who have been vaccinated, others who haven't, and others who can't. There are elements of our life together that will require additional research and contemplation like singing, coffee hour, in-person learning, and choir.

As a church we will be undertaking all of these decisions mindful of our faith, our mission, and the recommendations of the scientific and medical communities. We are making plans now to be ready knowing that we might need to change or cancel some of our plans as numbers change. Already at the April Council meeting, I asked each Board to begin making specific plans/ recommendations for the Fall so that we have a starting point and so that we can find places for collaboration. We know that these plans will evolve and change. We also know that if we do not get started, we won't be ready.

I ask each of you to pray for our work that it might be infused with the Spirit. I ask each of you for your wisdom and your patience. If you have good information or creative ideas to share, please give me a call or talk to the folks on any of the Boards. If there are things you have found to be a gift in this past year that we have been doing, let us know so that we can incorporate those things into our plans. If you are frustrated by our pace, please try to remember that we are working hard, doing our best to accommodate a diverse congregation, and feel free to volunteer to lend a hand.

I, like all of you, are so ready for this pandemic to be over and for us to emerge back into a more gathered and connected reality. Let us continue to care for one another as we emerge into our new reality just as we did when we entered this one last year.

#### **Worship Plans**

Worship is at the heart of our shared life. It is an important way we find connection, we abide in truth, and we become one body, one family. Over the past year, we have worked hard to find ways that allow us to continue worshipping while caring for one another's safety and the broader safety of our community. As vaccinations increase, as weather improves, and as over-all safety measures improved we are working equally hard to map out safe ways to gather in-person for worship. We understand and value the spiritual, emotional, and relational needs of the congregation and are imagining the best and safest ways to gather as soon as we can safely do so.

The Regathering Committee will be meeting the week of April 26 to finalize our plans for May. We will be continuing to rely on the case numbers in our area, guidance from our denomination and CDC guidelines. We will communicate quickly to let you know the details. There are a few things we have already decided:

We will hold outdoor morning worship on the Second and Fourth Sundays of the month. We will live-stream these services which will largely follow the blueprint of our Easter worship including requirements for registration, face coverings, and social distancing. Space will be marked out on the lawn for you to choose, bulletins will be provided upon your arrival, and you will be welcome to bring your own chairs or to use those on hand. All are welcome and opportunities for fellowship are currently being planned by Growth and Fellowship.

On the First, Third, and Fifth Sundays we are planning for ways to allow groups of a safe size into the sanctuary. The details of these are not yet finalized and are subject to the consideration of the Regathering Committee.

Pastor Brent and Diego are working to imagine technological ways that will provide for full participation of those in the sanctuary and those streaming these services. We imagine continuing to use recorded readings and other liturgical elements to include as much of the congregation in worship as we can. These would be seen and heard both over the live stream and in the sanctuary.

Vaccinations are now available to all people over the age of 16 and we hope that members of our congregation will avail themselves of the opportunity to get one out of care for one another.

We understand that younger children will not have the opportunity to get a vaccine for some time. Deacons have already begun discussing how we might hold special outdoor worship and fellowship time for families with kids in this transition time.

We are exploring the possibility of an additional "Evening Worship" outside as the weather warms. We imagine this to be a more informal service, with opportunities for contemplation, sharing, and connection. We are still discerning when and how such a service would be offered. Stay tuned.

#### **Board of Mission & Action**

The operation of the First Congregational Church of Stockbridge's Pop Up Pantry began on March 31. This outreach provides access to nonperishable, shelf stable food items to anyone in need. The pantry is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. According to Feeding America, hunger in the Berkshires rose by 153% during the Covid 19 pandemic – which is above the national average of 146%. We are seeking to bridge the gap for those people who may need emergency food. A specific food donation list is available on the church website or by clicking here. We ask that you not leave donations in the shed, they are organized inside the church in the CE classroom. If you are interested in helping out, please let Will know. You can donate funds to the Pop up Pantry specifically or designate funds to the Peoples Pantry in Great Barrington to assist those facing hunger.

In the last month, M & A is outreaching to local organizations we've assisted financially prior to the pandemic (Construct, Volunteers in Medicine, Gould Farm, Lit Net and the Elizabeth Freeman Center) to check in and gauge their needs. Please speak with one of the M & A members if you know of other unmet needs in our community that we should consider.

After suffering for several months, she finally has a good diagnosis, a good plan of action, and best of all, an excellent prognosis. And while we're giving thanks for modern medicine, let's not forget to mention the miracle of vaccines.



<u>The Jesus I Never Knew</u>, by Philip Yancey, delves deeply into the human person of Jesus of Nazareth and the concept of Jesus as God. The author

compares the gospel accounts and researches others' views of Jesus through playing and replaying scenes from many popular films made about the life of Jesus over the years. He examines his own struggles with belief and ultimately portrays a strong yet vulnerable God-made-human. He steps through Holy Week in great detail and sets it the known historic facts of that time and place. This book made Jesus much more real to me.
