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## August 2021 Newsletter

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Over the next couple of months, you will be hearing a good deal about a couple of things: coming back together (regathering) and my temporary leave-taking (sabbatical). Both are markers along our shared journey that have the potential for meaning making and renewal. Both are occupying the imagination and attention of staff and lay leadership. Approaching both can include wide ranging emotions from joy to worry and from fear to hope.

This time of pandemic has not been insignificant either in its length or impact. For more than one full year we have stayed connected, imagined new sources of beauty, and retained our identity as a church family. It has not always been easy and we have not always done it perfectly – but we have persevered and learned. Regathering will have profound joys (singing together, sharing a cup of coffee, sharing our lives together in sacred space, watching as our kids bring energy, listening to the voices and stories of our faith family and so much more). It will also have challenges. We have developed some new habits, preferences, and traditions in these times too. Coming back together will require openness both of sharing and listening; of holding on to cherished traditions and welcoming new truths; and of how church has been and what it is still becoming. I know this – that if we honor the way Christ has set before us and honor each other, we will live our way into the beauty of being church again in this time.

I love this church and the calling that God has placed before it. I am grateful, humbled, and

excited to serve as your Pastor – it is no small task either in what that role demands or the gifts it offers. Especially during the pandemic, it has offered new sets of both demands and gifts all while removing one of the core places I derive energy and meaning – being literally together in relationship and purpose. The pandemic also has delayed my chance to embark on my sabbatical as a time of renewal and re-connection for me to God, faith, and this church.

I have been working closely with Council, Boards, and the Sabbatical Committee to plan my time away from October until the end of December. We are making sure that details and logistics are thought out so that the congregation need not worry. The sabbatical is a chance for both me and the congregation to enjoy blessings of rest and reflection. It is a chance for both me and the congregation to slow down and contemplate the calling of our shared lives. It is a chance to be apart for a short time that our ongoing relationship might be strengthened and refreshed.

I am very much looking both to the time of rest and to coming back together again, sharing what we have learned, and moving forward with new purpose, new possibility, and a new bounce in our shared step! Stay tuned for more information – feel free to call anytime to talk more about either of these things.

#### **Worship Updates**

We continue to gather together to worship. It is a central time in our share life. A few things to keep in mind:

All Sunday morning worship will continue to be streamed. Our schedule through Sept 5:

All first/third/fifth Sundays are scheduled for indoors.

All second/fourth Sundays are scheduled for outdoors. (In the case of inclement weather, the service will move indoors.)

We no longer require registration. We do welcome people to go online to sign up to be a liturgist or a welcomer!

We continue to be guided by numbers, CDC recommendations, and local information. Given the data, we are retaining current practices which include:

Masking is always welcome and a beautiful sign of care.

For OUTDOOR worship, people are asked to mask as they go to their seats. Once they are in the area of their seats (and as long as they remain there) all may remove their mask regardless of vaccination status for all elements of worship.

For INDOOR worship, people are asked to mask as they go to their seats. Once they are in the area of their seats (and as long as they remain there), those who are not fully vaccinated are asked to remain masked. Those who are fully vaccinated may remove their mask for all elements of worship.

#### Sabbatical Committee

Hello from the newly formed Sabbatical Committee! We met with Brent recently to begin discussing the things that will need attention while Brent is on his 3 month sabbatical. Committee members are: Cathy Clark (Church Moderator), Michael Deegan (Deacon) Holland Eaton (Church Council/Growth & Fellowship) and Charlotte Rodgers (Church Council/Mission & Action).

While every board will have specific responsibilities during Brent's sabbatical, the Sabbatical Committee will take on the role of imagining, designing, communicating and facilitating church wide things that will need to get done – as well as being available to deal with anything that comes up unexpectedly.

We're looking forward to communicating to you in this newsletter, and in person, as together we navigate the sabbatical experience.

### **Capital Campaign Steering Committee**

Thank you all for all your thoughtful and heartfelt suggestions of your "Needs and Dreams" for a potential Capital Campaign.

The Steering Committee continues to process the lengthy list and to determine reasonable estimates, moving toward a Feasibility Study by our consultant, Jennifer Williams, in September, to determine a likely Capital Campaign goal, and then a congregational vote in October on whether to proceed with a Capital Campaign.

Meanwhile, work is being done to help keep our church buildings protected and inviting. Almost everything was removed from the basement so that the Green Collar crew could install a vapor barrier on the floor. Then they blew in insulation into all the attics. Thanks to the Trustees, over half of the cost of this project was covered through a MassSave grant. While this insulation work is mostly invisible, you might notice the freshly painted gables of the JE/classroom wing and some of the trim on the Manse.

Work so far has been covered through our Capital Reserve Fund, and Council has approved a \$100,000 line of credit to ensure that needed work continues.

Two major projects are in the offing: resetting the sanctuary front steps, necessary to protect the building from further water damage; and a new accessibility ramp outside the JE Room entrance.

The Steering Committee will continue to keep you appraised, and we welcome your questions, comments and suggestions.

#### On the Nightstand

We are a blessed with the joy of reading in our congregation. Each month we invite you to share what is providing joy or meaning for you that you would recommend for others. We start with what Pastor Brent has been reading this month and look forward to hearing from you!

- In progress: <u>The Ragged Edge of Night by Olivia Hawker</u> this beautifully written and gripping story takes on the moral, physical, and familial struggles of life in WW II Germany through the eyes of a Franciscan friar and the family he comes to love and claim.
- Finished recently: For the Life of the World by Miroslav Volf and Matthew Croasman (see Men's Book Group section) this challenging work releases a sense of joy, purpose and possibility in this endeavor we undertake of faith.
  Brilliantly combining aspects of traditional theology with a broad cross-section of scripture and church life the book stakes the claim that God creates for the purpose of flourishing and calls us into the task of making a home for God and us together.
- Finished recently: <u>The Magic Mountain</u> by Thomas Mann this lengthy tome dives deeply into ideas of life and death, time, meaning, and the human condition through the eyes



of young Hans Castorp who travels to a sanatorium in the Swiss Alps to visit a cousin. The story finds life in his interactions with the diverse and intriguing cast of character Castorp claims as family in his seven years there.

#### **Men's Book Read Forming**

Our church enjoys many traditions. Among them is the Men's Group. The two most gatherings included an exploration of *Puritan Boston, Quaker Philadelphia* led by Max Stackhouse and a study of Jonathan Edwards based on a work by George Marsden led by Rick Floyd.

In consultation with Rick, Pastor Brent will be sharing the work *For the Life of the World; Theology that Makes a Difference* written by Miroslav Volf and Matthew Croasmun. This relatively short work (185 pages) tackles critically important questions about what it means to experience "true life in the presence of God." The authors dedicate their work to their daughters and proclaim it to be a manifesto on how to reclaim the importance of theology for the world.

While the book is aimed at "theologians" it should not surprise anyone that Pastor Brent thinks that we are all theologians. The plan is to meet three times with each session covering two chapters and approximately 60 pages. The book is challenging, yet deeply provocative. It is concerned with the current state of



things while deeply hopeful and beautiful. It brings together Bible, theology, and community into wonderful dialogue.

Books are available in the church office. Those who choose to participate will be provided with a glossary (to cover the theological terms) and a short video will be prepared for each session to help participants encounter the reading. We will meet the week of August 16, August 30 and September 13. Prior studies have been held over coffee and doughnuts in the morning (8:00 a.m.) so that folks can get to their day. While we hope to follow a similar schedule we will confirm once interest has been gauged.
