

Dear Church Family,

I love seasons. I love the seasons of spring, summer, fall, and winter because they invite us to notice particular gifts of each. They draw our attention to blessings and gifts that make up the whole of life and that might go otherwise unnoticed. Those gifts also invite a response in

the way we live both in the moment and in our discernment of what really matters.

So too, I love the seasons in the church year and I love them for the same reasons. This October we will observe two special

Sundays of the church year - World Communion Sunday and All Saints Sunday. In between those critical times, we will engage in a time of gratitude and giving. Through it all, I pray our hearts might be drawn to blessings and gifts that might otherwise go unnoticed. Through it all, I pray we find even deeper ways to live in faith, hope, and love.

We begin the month on October 2 focused squarely on unity and connection. Since its introduction at the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA in 1933, World Communion Sunday has sought to draw our attention to what unites us around the table of Christ rather than anything that divides us. Through the history of this event are two concepts that are at the heart of our own denomination – details we sometimes forget or take for granted. The first is that Jesus is the head of the church and the second is that we are all

called to be one. As we gather this year drawing our attention outward to the church universal, I wonder how greater attention to those two truths of our tradition might evoke a response in how we live as a church here in Stockbridge.

We end the month on October 30 focused likewise on unity and connection. Through

special worship, music, and fellowship we will bring our hearts and minds to focus on the great cloud of witnesses that surround us on All Saints Sunday. Like World Communion Sunday, All Saints holds an element dear to our understanding of faith. The day draws our attention to our forebears, our love for them, what we learned

from them, and what we cherish about them. But it does so in a way that reminds us that we are running our own race. That they give us the courage, hope, and perseverance to do so in our own time. I wonder how holding both those things in our hearts might evoke a response in how we live as a church here in Stockbridge.

Finally, between those two bookends, we will be launching our annual stewardship program – a chance to support the lifeblood and ministries of this church. Our theme this year, "From Bread and Cup to Faith and Giving," bridges how we begin and end the month. I pray this month a time of blessing and connection. I pray that we notice those little and big things in our shared life that we might take for granted. I pray that through it all how we live might as a church will blossom and deepen. Come and see.

Board of Deacons

For those who have been keeping up with Deacon news, you might recall that we have been experimenting with an "inverted agenda" for our meeting, which allows the meatier

questions that were usually at the bottom of the agenda (and inevitably shortchanged from lack of time) to rise to the top, while the "business" items now fall at the end. We again used this "inverted agenda" at our last meeting to allow time for a second "prayerstorming"—a discussion and brainstorm around the role of prayer in our worship.

In our prayerstorming we discussed everything from the importance of communal prayer opportunities, to different forms of prayer that we might wish to incorporate into services. One question we held was how to keep being "jostled" by the prayers we regularly say, such as the Lord's Prayer, so that we continue to hear and reflect on these words in new ways. Another question we held is how to make prayer moments welcoming and inclusive of

everyone, whether by striving to make sure there is inclusive language, experimenting with new entry points to prayer, or creating more accessible ways for people to share personal prayers. Brent, Sarah, and Anna will continue to meet as a

prayer task force to consider how some of the Deacons ideas about prayers might be implemented in upcoming worship services. Please reach out to one of us if you'd like to share any thoughts or ideas about prayer in our worship life.

Jewish Family Services of Western Mass (JFSWM)

See below for an Urgent Appeal from Gabriela Sheehan at JFSWM's Pittsfield office, for help in resettling 2 new families from Guatemala in the Berkshires. JFSWM is the sponsoring agency for the Hussaini Family that we are hosting in partnership with the UU Meeting in Housatonic.

Urgently, we need a Host Family for each family. This request is for someone to open their home for any amount of time they choose while we search for housing and set up the apartment. <u>Ideally, this would be in Pittsfield, Lenox, Dalton, or Lanesboro</u>. Even giving a week buys us time to reach out to landlords and wait for changes to leases to free up apartments. Alternatively, if someone is willing to share their rental/second home rent free or for reduced rent, it would be very appreciated.

If you or anyone you know can open their home for a little while, we'd be so grateful. Our first family arrived September 8th, a husband and wife, a 19 year old son and 17 year old daughter. On September 13, we welcomed a family of 6 (Husband, wife, 15 year old son, 8 year old son, 6 year old daughter, and 8 month baby boy.)

In addition to apartments, we are looking for basic supplies to stock these apartments. Many items can be gently used, but some must be new. If you'd be willing to drop off items, you can do so at the JFS office at 67 East St., Pittsfield. <u>Our list for the family of 4 is here</u>.

If you prefer to click and send, I have created an <u>Amazon Wishlist</u>. All items will be sent directly

to our office, and we will use them immediately for these families.

Lastly, we are accepting dishware, pots and pans, and small appliances. We are also in great need of baby clothes, size 6 months to 24 months, outerwear for children, all sizes...boots, mittens, hats, warm coats and rainwear and in good condition please.

Thank you, as always, for your community support and help in welcoming the stranger and protecting the refugee.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED ANNUAL OFFERING

If someone ever asks you, Is your church 5 for 5? You can say YES! What is 5 for 5, you say? Well, our congregation is one of nearly 1,600 UCC churches that are 5 for 5. This means that we fully support the United Church of Christ's program called "Our Church's Wider Mission," along with all four of our denomination's special mission offerings which occur at different times of the year. Through your financial pledges to this church, the Mission & Action Board is able to give \$500 each to "Our Church's Wider Mission" and to the four special offerings.

On October 2, World Communion Sunday, we are highlighting the offering called Neighbors in Need, which supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States, including support for the Council for American Indian Ministry, and a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.

In the past, our church would take up a special offering from the congregation for Neighbors in Need. For the past few years, we have instead put part of your annual pledge money into the Mission & Action operating budget, and we have given \$500 from that budget to Neighbors in Need each year. That is what we're doing this year as well. While we are not asking for contributions to the offering this year, Mission & Action wanted to let you know about this important ministry that your pledge dollars are helping to support.

This year's Neighbors in Need offering focuses on economic justice. One-third of the offering supports the Council for American Indian Ministry, which is the voice for American Indian people in the UCC. CAIM provides Christian ministry and witness to American Indians and to the wider church. Two-thirds of the offering is used by Justice and Witness Ministries to provide grants to support UCC churches and organizations in doing justice, seeking peace, and building vibrant faith communities that are welcoming to all.

Through this offering we express our deep commitment to reaching out and touching our neighbors with justice and compassion. This allows us to speak prophetically to those in power and to advocate for a society where all people have a voice in decisions that affect their lives. In the spirit of Christ, we seek to confront evil in the



world and to alleviate suffering. We do this through direct service as well as advocacy.

Stockbridge Festival Chorus Announces Rehearsal Schedule for Christmas Concert


The Stockbridge Festival Chorus, based at First Congregational Church of Stockbridge on Main Street, will begin rehearsals on Sunday, October 2 to prepare for its annual Christmas concert, scheduled for Saturday, December 10. Rehearsals will run weekly in the sanctuary on Sundays from 1 to 3 pm. Any interested singer is invited to attend; enrollment will be accepted through October 16. Dues are \$40 to cover the cost of the music which will be made available at the first rehearsal attended. Scholarships

are available and dues will be waived for new tenors and basses.

Music selections will be compositions by beloved composers including John Rutter, Herbert Howells, William Mathias, Philip Stopford; and a collection of English carols by Jonathan Willcocks. The Festival Chorus is celebrating its 35th anniversary with this concert season. It is comprised of approximately 40 singers from the community and no audition is required. All are welcome. The Festival Chorus is conducted by Tracy Wilson; Bob Logan is the rehearsal pianist.

COVID policies will be observed. All singers must be fully vaccinated with one booster, masks must be worn entering and exiting the sanctuary but masks do not need to be worn when singing; seating will spaced apart, and a section in the back of the sanctuary for those needing more space will be reserved.
