

Dear Church Family,

Happy New Year! By the time you receive this newsletter, a new liturgical year will already be underway. The church year starts, wisely so, with Advent – a return to an amazing story of faith. It is a story replete with stunning imagery. It is a story chocked full of a colorful cast of characters. It is a story with a plotline that invites you in and leaves you clamoring for more. It is the story of a profound truth that changed the world and offers to continue changing our lives. A story of hope, faith, and love. A story of how an impossible possibility came in the most improbable way – the story of a baby born in a manger.

Each year we return to the story. We do in part to greet a familiar friend that provides grounding and hope – to bask in tradition – to bring us back to perhaps the seminal story of our lives. Each year we return to the story. We do in part because we have learned that when we approach with an open heart, there are previously undiscovered miracles waiting to be found – new characters to relate to – new possibilities we somehow have missed each of the years previous. We return to the story because deep down we are the people of the story and that is good.

This year I want to start the year off by inviting you to use this new year by joining in an

exploration of the larger story captured in the Bible. I have found incredible joy and energy in a book written by Rachel Held Evans titled *Inspired*. It is a book all about being people of the story. Her subtitle is “Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again.” I LOVED IT! I want to share it with you – my fellow people of the story.

I think that Bible junkies will love not only her insights, but those drawn from folks who have become close friends of hers (people like Nadia Bolz Webber, Walter Brueggemann, and Peter Ens to name just a few). I think that those who are not sure of what to do with the Bible will love her honest struggle with the same issue. I think those who don’t know the stories of the Bible will love it because she will introduce you to them in ways that will stir your imagination and invite you to find meaning.

In my ten years here, I am not sure I have ever felt as positively or as strongly about the potential of any single book for the life of our congregation. Her take both on the stories of the Bible and why it matters has the potential to inspire and, I believe, even transform our shared life. How we engage this book is still being developed but, in the meantime, I hope you read it! We have copies in the church office and the audiobook is read beautifully by the author.

As we prepare to return to the amazing story of love come down on Christmas, may we remember that we are people of the story and let Rachel Held Evans bring new depth to that reality.

Financial Notes

Thank you to all who have submitted pledges for 2023! This timely submission is tremendously helpful for budgeting purposes and is greatly appreciated. We realize that there are new pledges that are still coming in. Feel free to mail them, drop them in the church office or offering plate, or email them. Thank you for your thoughtful and prayerful pledging.

2022 Pledges/ Year-end Giving: This is the time of year to complete your 2022 pledge and/or make other year-end gifts. I am happy to provide pledge status updates on an individual basis at any time. Pledge status letters will also be mailed out in early December to all pledgers except those who have completed their pledge for the year.

If you wish to have annual pledge or other contributions recorded on your 2022 Giving Statement, you may send year-end checks dated no later than Dec. 31. We need to receive year-end checks no later than Jan. 15.

Pledge Envelope Reminder: Due to fewer folks requesting giving envelopes, we will not be distributing the usual boxes of envelopes for 2023. This will help our printing budget, too! However, we are glad to provide “home-made” or recycled giving envelopes upon request. If so, please let me know if you need 12 for monthly giving, or 52 for weekly giving. Of course, you may use any envelopes of your own.

**The only time an envelope is necessary is when you give cash and wish to have that included in your giving record.

A simple tracking sheet will also be available to record your contributions throughout the year. You may wish to use this in lieu of envelopes for keeping track of your giving.

Board of Deacons

Recently the Deacons have been considering how our church can continue to live into the welcome advertised in our Open and Affirming commitment statement. While we have made meaningful progress in making our church a safe and welcoming place for all, the Deacons have recently been considering our transgender and gender non-conforming siblings. Can we continue to push our language and our practices so that all people, no matter what their gender identity, may feel at home here? This idea, to start a larger conversation in our church community around gender inclusive language, was the subject of a proposal recently made by the Deacons to Council.

Council was very supportive of the proposal, leaving the Deacons to consider how to move the task forward. We feel it is an initiative that ranges beyond the scope of our own Board, and should have wide representation, and so are open to ideas from you. In the meantime, we will continue to look for ways to make the language we use in our services welcoming to all.

On a seasonal note, Advent is here—a time traditionally marked by waiting and expectation, reflection and penitence, and the color purple. As Advent progresses, you will see additional decorations appear as we prepare both God’s house and our hearts for the arrival of Jesus. This popular concert at this festive venue has been sold out for the last few years, so purchase tickets early.

Tickets for Dec. 9 and Dec. 17 are \$20 and will be sold at the door, with children and students 18 and under admitted for free. Tickets for Dec. 11 at Saint James Place are \$25 for all, with no discount for children due to the more limited seating capacity. Advent Prayer Tree

Prayer is a central part of worship and of our shared life. Prayer is a way we share, we become vulnerable, we allow others (God and neighbor) into our lives, and we wait in hopeful expectation for a response.

The Deacons have been spending a substantial amount of time talking about prayer and imagining how we can help the congregation to abide in prayerful experiences in new and deeper ways.


During Advent, tags will be available both on Sundays at worship and during the week from the office. People are invited to write a prayer request on the tag to be hung on the prayer tree in the sanctuary.

On Sundays, tags can either be placed by an individual on the tree or put in the offering plates. We will collect those placed in the offering and read the prayers exactly as written on the card as part of the sharing of joys and concerns before

placing them on the tree. *(Since the tree will be on display for the public, be mindful of any personally identifying details that others might not wish to be shared.)* We ask that those who leave requests with the Church Office indicate whether you would like them read out loud on the following Sunday or simply placed on the tree.

We hope that this enables all to share their prayers and for the larger congregation to be aware of them and pray for them.
