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

Church of Christ, an underlying theological approach is one of story – one on hand the infinite story of the divine and the human story and how they dance together.

Stories are amazing things – they weave together a narrative and invite us in. They convey more than an

Their meaning ultimately is shaped not just by the words on the page but by how those words dance with our own lived experience, imagination, needs, hopes, and desires. Every time a story is told it finds a new birth – just like the one we just gathered to hear and remember on Christmas Eve.



important parts of our shared life – worship and study. Through small groups, we will be diving into the book Inspired, Rachel Held Evans' insightful work on the Bible as sacred story. 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Reviewing Staff Performance

The church has a Personnel Committee which has the responsibility of conducting an annual review of the performance of each of the church's permanent staff members. Why? We want to create a supportive and dynamic environment so that each staff member can work to their best potential with high job satisfaction. Our process will include both providing feedback to the staff member and receiving feedback from them. By receiving feedback on their performance and suggestions regarding future performance, employees can become even more effective. Thus, the committee has developed what it feels, is a thorough, fair and reasonable process to accomplish this:

First, we and the staff member agree upon an accurate and comprehensive description of job responsibilities.

Second, we ask several parties to provide the committee with a written assessment of the staff member's performance on key responsibilities of the position. The employee is always asked for a self-evaluation. Peers and the supervisor of the employee are asked for their reflections on how the individual is doing and for suggestions as to how that person could perform even better. Feedback from the congregation is also requested.

Third, the Personnel Committee will combine the feedback received from these sources into a comprehensive report and will then hold a comprehensive discussion with the staff member to explore ways in which the employee could be even more effective.

As a last step, the Committee will recommend appropriate adjustments in duties and compensation to the Church Council and Board of Trustees.








Inspired – *Small Groups*

Rachel Held Evans (1981-2019) is a treasure. She is known for her books and articles about faith, doubt, and life. She has been featured in everything from the Washington Post and NPR to BBC and Christianity Today. She served on President Obama's Council of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships. She was a great source of inspiration on my sabbatical in remembering the beauty of what church and faith can be as well as the challenges we often bring to our shared life.



For me, *Inspired* and its exploration of the Bible

struck a beautiful balance between honest human struggles in encountering sacred texts and scholarship on those same texts. As the book cover relays, "If the Bible isn't a science book or an instruction manual, then what is it? What do people mean when they say the Bible is inspired? When Rachel Held Evans found herself asking these questions, she began a quest to better understand what the Bible is and how it is meant to be read. What she discovered changed her and it will change you too."

As we embark on a new year both in the liturgical calendar and the secular one too, we have an opportunity to come to our sacred texts with fresh perspectives. I am convinced that whether you are a Bible devotee or whether the book scares you, the kinds of questions and answers Rachel brings forth will have meaning. Here are some opportunities to engage. We anticipate some more to be announced and led by different folks – pay attention to our website and weekly e-mails for those details. Here are the plans for the two sections I plan to lead:

• Wednesday Mid-Day Conversations (Noon – 12:55 Hybrid)

Wednesdays January 11,18, 25 & February 1, 8, 15

In each of these hour-long sessions, we will explore two chapters of the book. There will be the chance for people to raise questions about the stories and the Biblical or theological implications raised by Evans. Just as important, though, will be the chance for us to linger in imagination about what it means for our own lives and how we might encounter the Bible in life-giving ways.

• Wednesday Dinner Club – (6:00 – 8:00 anticipated; in-person)

Wednesdays January 11, 25 & February 8

These sessions will involve participants banding together to prepare a simple meal and share it. Through that extended time, we will engage in lively conversation about the book and its meaning for us and our church.

Kim Ruffing will lead a Zoom/hybrid option on a weeknight that works best. Contact Kim or the church office if you are interested.
