Closing of *Where Do We Go From Here* by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.:

We are now faced with the fact that tomorrow is today. We are confronted with the fierce urgency of now. In this unfolding conundrum of life and history there is such a thing as being too late. Procrastination is still the thief of time. Life often leaves us standing bare, naked and dejected with a lost opportunity. The "tide in the affairs of men" does not remain at the flood; it ebbs. We may cry out desperately for time to pause in her passage, but time is deaf to every plea and rushes on. Over the bleached bones and jumbled residues of numerous civilizations are written the pathetic words: "Too late." There is an invisible book of life that faithfully records our vigilance or our neglect. "The moving finger writes, and having writ moves on..." We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent coannihilation. This may well be mankind's last chance to choose between chaos and community.

Great is Thy Faithfulness history ~ Peter Frost

Thomas O. Chisholm, (1866-1960), was born in Franklin, Kentucky in a log cabin. He became a teacher at the age of sixteen without the benefit of a formal education. By the age of 21 he was the associate editor of the local newspaper. By the time he retired he had written over 1200 poems. These poems appeared in publications like *Moody Monthly* and *Alliance Weekly*. Many were set to music.

William Marion Runyan (1870-1957), was born in New York and died 87 years later in Pittsburgh. By the age of twelve he was working as a substitute organist. By the age of 21 he was ordained a Methodist minister later turning to evangelism.

According to hymnologist Kenneth Osbeck, Thomas Chisholm set a number of his poems to music by the Rev. Runyan. Runyan wrote: *This particular poem held such an appeal that I prayed most earnestly that my tune might carry over its message in a worthy way, and the subsequent history of its use indicates that God answered prayer.*

George Beverly Shea, the famous singer known for his work with the Billy Graham Crusade introduced this hymn at evangelical meetings in 1954 and it quickly became a favorite.
