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

Neighbors in Need

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States.

In 2024, the Neighbors in Need theme is "Mental Health Justice For All!" In 2015, the General Synod of the UCC passed a resolution to become WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged) for mental health. A just world for all is a world where the human rights and well-being of people with mental health challenges are respected, no matter who you are or where you are in life's mental health journey.

Through this offering we express our deep commitment to reaching out and touching our neighbors with justice and compassion. This allows us to speak prophetically to those in power and to advocate for a society where all people have a voice in decisions that affect their lives. In the spirit of Christ, we will seek to confront evil in the world and to alleviate suffering. NIN funds are also utilized by staff to develop social justice resources, such as webinars, bible studies, curriculums, and advocacy tools within the program areas of environmental justice, racial justice, LGBTQ justice, economic justice, women's justice, and immigration justice.

- ◆ **DON'T** miss it!




From the Service League

Pro Tempore: Choir News

Hello choir members and anyone interested in singing in the choir – there is always room for more singers so if you're interested, come find me at coffee hour.

Adult Choir: we will sing twice a month, the first and third weeks in the months of October, November and December. So in October, here are the dates: Sunday, October 6 (World Communion Sunday) and Sunday, October 20. For October 6th, we will be singing the full Mark Miller Communion Service, and a favorite anthem of mine: *Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether* by Harold Friedell.

On the Sundays the choir sings, please gather in the loft at 8:55 am for warm ups, run the hymns, learn the introit, prayer response and offertory anthem. We'll leave 10 minutes to run a new anthem for the following choir Sunday. There will be no Thursday evening choir rehearsals in the pro tempore season.

Additional rehearsal: Sunday, October 20, we will return to the choir loft 15 minutes after the service ends to work on the anthems for November. 45 minutes maximum. We will have additional rehearsals on November 17 (for Advent and Christmas music), and December 15 for Christmas Eve music.

All anthems and special music for the current month will be made available in a basket in the music office by the beginning of each month.

Kid's Choir and Bells: we are excited to be including them in the fall-Advent season!

Kid's choir meets twice a month (second and fourth Sundays) from 9:15 to 9:50 in the small classroom in preparation for sharing their music during the service on the fourth Sunday. Stay tuned for bell choir news.

Festival Chorus: starts up Sunday, October 6, from 1 to 3 pm, and takes place every Sunday up to the concert date of Saturday, December 14. The main selections for the concert will be Vaughan Williams' Fantasia on Christmas Carols, featuring John Demler; Vaughan William's Magnificat for Women's Voices and Contralto featuring Ukrainian singer Vira Slywotzky; plus anthems by Dale Jergenson and David Anderegg. Dues are \$40 to cover the cost of music and some expenses. Any interested singer is invited to come and check us out; no audition is necessary.

Husain and Fatema - an update



Many of you will recall the Afghan family that our congregation cosponsored with the Unitarian Universalist Meeting of South Berkshire. In August, Husain and Fatema and their four children moved from Pittsfield to Virginia.

Husain and Fatema and three children were relocated to Pittsfield through Jewish Family Service of Western Mass January 1, 2022. You provided a warm welcome to a family that had to leave Afghanistan quickly with nothing. You gave furniture, food, clothing, gift cards and furnishings to help them get settled in their Pittsfield apartment. Our congregation, through Mission & Action, contributed toward a car and we gave them a crib at the baby shower for their fourth child in January 2023.

We will miss them but we can feel proud that we helped them settle in to their first home in the United States. They adapted well to a new culture and showed amazing resilience after all they had been through. Husain will continue his job remotely. The two older children are in school, while Fatema is busy taking care of the younger girls.

I had the opportunity to visit Fatema and Husain in their new home a few weeks ago. It is a lovely (and larger) apartment in a nice neighborhood. There is a large Afghan community and they have a Halal market nearby.

Fatema and Husain expressed their gratitude to our congregation for all that was done for them. We wish them all the best in their new home.
