

All: Lead us to places of humility and refresh our spirits in the nurturing waters of your encouragement. Amen.



Luke 6:1-10

One sabbath while Jesus was going through the cornfields, his disciples plucked some heads of grain, rubbed them in their hands, and ate them. But some of the Pharisees said, 'Why are you doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?' Jesus answered, 'Have you not read what David did when he and his companions were hungry? He entered the house of God and took and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and gave some to his companions?' Then he said to them, 'The Son of Man is lord of the sabbath.'

On another sabbath he entered the synagogue and taught, and there was a man there whose right hand was withered. The scribes and the Pharisees watched him to see whether he would cure on the sabbath, so that they might find an accusation against him. Even though he knew what they were thinking, he said to the man who had the withered hand, 'Come and stand here.' He got up and stood there. 
## SUNG COMMUNION LITURGY

...Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with the choirs of heaven and with all the faithful of every time and place, who forever sing to the glory of your name:




Pastor: You are indeed holy O God of Majesty and blessed is your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Who came as the light of all people.



## **Music Notes**

Tracy Wilson, Minister of Music pro tem

The music making during the month of February will celebrate Black History Month showcasing the three main types of Black American sacred music: spirituals, gospels and hymns. My prelude, This Little Light of Mine, is a traditional spiritual that has been arranged by many people. The Introit is an example of a traditional hymn as we know it (a song of adoration and praise to God) with some interesting melodic and rhythmic influences by Harry Burleigh (1866-1949), a highly educated singer and composer. Burleigh named the tune MCKEE for the rector of St. George's Episcopal Church in NYC where he served as baritone soloist for over 50 years. The choir's two anthems are the epitomes of spirituals expressing deep religious feelings. The Doxology uses music composed

by William Farley Smith (1941-1997) with the traditional words by The Right Reverend Thomas Ken in 1695, revised in 1709. Farley Smith was highly educated and served as minister of music at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Harlem, NY for a number of years. He was known as a researcher and restorer of African-American music, playing a large role in the African Diaspora of Sacred Music and Musicians. He served as composer and arranger for the 1989 edition of the United Methodist Hymnal (Nashville, 1989).

Our Sung Communion Liturgy is by Black composer Mark A. Miller. He is Professor of Church Music at Drew Theological School and is a lecturer in the practice of sacred music at Yale University. He is also the Minister of Music at Christ Church in Summit, New Jersey. He is a life-long United Methodist.

## News and Upcoming Events Lenten Study: Understanding the Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ

Rick Floyd and Jeremy Ridenour are offering a six-week course during Lent discussing the doctrine of the atonement. Atonement theories provide a narrative to understand how the death and resurrection of Jesus saves us from sin, death, and evil. The group will read portions of Rev. Floyd's book *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross: Reflections on the Atonement*. The group will meet for six consecutive Thursdays: March 6, 13, 20, 27 and April 3 and 10, 6:00-7:00 pm at the church.
