Brian Hoffman is a concert organist whose numerous performances include solo recitals at St. Patrick's Cathedral NYC, Methuen Memorial Music Hall, and on the world's largest church organ at West Point Cadet Chapel. As a composer, he has written numerous works for choir, organ, and various ensembles. As a recording artist, he has recorded his original compositions, as well as organ works of J.S. Bach and Cesar Franck. His ongoing project, begun during the pandemic of 2020, is the recordings of the complete organ works of J.S. Bach on organs from around the world via the Hauptwerk program. Brian served as concert organist for the Stockbridge Festival Chorus for a number of years in the early 2000s.

Tim Pyper is Lecturer in Music/College Organist at Williams College and Director of Music at St. John's, Williamstown. Prior to this, he was Director of Music at the Church of the Holy Apostles, New York City (2017-2023) and Director of Music at the Cathedral Church of the Redeemer, Calgary (2010-2015). Originally from Canada, he trained at the Eastman School of Music (B.M., M.M., Performer's Certificate) and at Cornell University (D.M.A.). Pyper is also an AmSAT-certified instructor of the Alexander Technique and regularly gives workshops on optimal ergonomic functioning for musicians.


Edwin Lawrence enjoys a career as a performer on piano, organ and harpsichord and as a conductor and composer. He recently retired as Minister of Music for the First Congregational Church, UCC of Williamstown MA. He is an Artist Associate at Williams College. Mr. Lawrence served as Music Director for the Bennington County Choral Society for more than 38 seasons. As a producer for Dorian Recordings, he was directly involved with more than 20 recording projects. In 1976, he was one of the composers chosen to represent Vermont in the Bicentennial Parade of American music in the nation's capital. Still in the era of the LP, he recorded "Organ Music from Hildene" at Robert Todd Lincoln's Manchester, VT home. Lawrence is a founding member of the Consortium of Vermont Composers and has served as a guest conductor of the Vermont Symphony Orchestra. In 1990, he received a Citation of Merit from the Vermont Council of the Arts for his contributions to the vitality of the arts in the Green Mountain State. Lawrence is currently the concert organist for the Stockbridge Festival Chorus.

Nick Reid works for Czelusniak et Dugal and was very involved in the restoration of our organ. He is a pianist by trade and has been playing since the age of 3. He is largely a self taught organist who made his way to the Worthington church (and served for 15 years) through his years of working and tuning a number of pianos in his nearby community. The Williamsburg Congregational Church offered Nick a position during the COVID shutdown where he performed his own compositions and improvisations, and where he currently serves as organist and pianist since 2023. Nick was very excited to participate in our organ's restoration as the instrument at the Williamsburg church is only ONE opus ahead of the Stockbridge organ. They are, as he says, "sisters"!

Whence Cometh the Sounds of These New Winds? ~ Ron Hanft

Our pipe organ began its life with us in 1865 as Opus 183 of the William A. Johnson company of Westfield MA. Prior to 1865 the church used a melodeon, a small reed organ. In a renovation of the sanctuary in 1855-56, a new melodeon was purchased that coincided with preparation of an organ and choir loft at the rear of the balcony above the narthex.

The change to a pipe organ in the chancel area in 1865 was a significant enlargement of the sound and the role of this instrument in worship and in the music life of the congregation. But it didn't end there. With minor changes along the way, the most significant changes and enlargements were made in 1955 and 1980-82. Since then, some subtle but important features began to fail. Now, with the current refurbishment of our organ, its full capacity has been restored.

More history of the organ and our church can be found in the book "How Firm a Foundation" which will be available to purchase in the Jonathan Edwards Room following the concert.
