

Yes, God so loves the world as to give the only begotten one as whoever believes may not die but have eternal life. God sent the only begotten into the world not to condemn the world but that through the only begotten the whole world might be saved. John 3:16-17 Inclusive Translation

Dear Church Family,

John 3:16-3:17 is a powerful testimony not only to what God is up to through Easter but how and why. I never cease to be amazed at the positivity of it all. Through the events of Holy Week and Easter, through the events of Jesus's life, death, and resurrection, things like death and sin and diminishment are overcome – defeated, vanquished even. Just as importantly, this passage reminds us of the "for-ness" behind it all. The gift of it all, the life of it all, the purpose not that people and the whole world would be condemned but rather that it and we would be saved.

Throughout our Lenten readings we have seen that same "for-ness." We have witnessed the patient and deep love of a father for both of his sons. We have heard the deep longing of Jesus and his hen-like devotion to the people, desiring to spread out his wings for their protection. We have beheld a stranger's profound compassion and care for that poor man beaten and left to die on the road between Jerusalem and Jericho. Over and over again we have brought our burdens and our gratitudes to lay at the foot of the cross where Jesus poured out everything for us.

As Jesus approached Jerusalem, as the powers of earth rose up to stop him, He kept on being for everyone else. He forgave, he healed, he fed, he taught, he held, he even raised people from the dead – all of it for them. On the night of his betrayal he gathered his disciples, he fed them,

he prayed for them, and in John's Gospel he not only served them he protected them. On the cross Jesus was still showing his "for-ness" – forging a mother and son bond, offering salvation to a convicted criminal, and forgiving everyone. For-ness on full display.

This year not only as we approach Easter but as we live into its meaning, I hope that "for-ness" is also our primary motivation. In our times, we may be called upon to stand up and against injustice. We may need to protest and defend. I pray though that we follow the example of Christ – concerning ourselves less with the powers of Earth and more how to be "for" those in need – how we bear witness to the power of love, kindness, and hope. The post Easter church lived into the way of Jesus – being for life. They existed for each other, the poor, and the widows. They lived until no one any longer had need – amazing.

Much to the dismay of many, the life, the death, and even the resurrection of Jesus did little ostensibly to change the power structures of the day. But to the delight of those who followed Jesus his life, his death, and his resurrection did everything to change how they lived for themselves, for others, and even for the whole world. Two thousand years later their lives modeled on Christ's way, a way that is profoundly for the other no matter what the powers of the earth do, continues to have the power to change everything.

I look forward to the journey with you to the cross and to our shared journey beyond the tomb - a journey of "for-ness" and the impossible made possible through Christ.

The choir will be returning to the loft on Sunday,
April 6 to sing a few of my favorite pieces for
choir: Behold the Lamb of God from The
Messiah, and Lutkin's The Lord Bless You and
Keep You (please feel free to sing along with
them!). The choir will also sing a beautiful piece
from Dvorak's Stabat Mater for tenor soloist
(Rich Geiler) and tenors and basses. Stabat Mater
is a 13-century Christian hymn to the Virgin
Mary that portrays her suffering as a mother
during the crucifixion of her son Jesus Christ.
The text is in Latin and is translated as "Let me
weep beside thee, mourning the crucifixion, for
as long as I live".

Sunday, April 13, the bells will help us celebrate Palm Sunday and will accompany the congregational procession with palms. This service will recognize the importance of Passion Sunday using special music by the bells, a powerful solo by Rich Geiler entitled "What a Savior!" with music written by Edwin Childs, text by Philip Bliss, and hymns that will both celebrate the joy of Palm Sunday, while we turn our lives toward Holy Week. Communion will take us to the Upper Room.

Thursday, April 17, Maundy Thursday, I am inviting any available choir members to sing a few meditative pieces during the evening service (please report at 6:30 pm in the sanctuary).

Sunday, April 20: EASTER SUNDAY! He lives! The choir, bells, Berkshire Brass, organ: we are pulling out all the stops for the 10 am service. (Choir, please report at 8:45 am). Two significant pieces from Handel's Messiah will be sung: I Know My Redeemer Liveth by Amy Shake, and Worthy is the Lamb by the choir.

Sunday, April 20 will be my last Sunday at Minister of Music Pro Tempore. Thank you for your support, your ideas, the amazing dedication of the choir, and your loving embrace and acceptance at some of my music choices! I love my church as I love sacred music and putting together a musically meaningful service with Brent.

Saturday, April 12, 3:00 PM. Stockbridge Festival Chorus Presents Mozart's Requiem

Stockbridge Festival Chorus, a 38-year old community chorus based at our church, will perform the Mozart Requiem for its Spring concert on Saturday, April 12, 3:00 pm. A piece composed in 2015 by David Stone, In the Darkest Hour, will be sung prior to the Requiem. A reception will be held after the concert. Admission is a \$20 donation at the door, \$10 for local community choir members, and free for people age 18 and under.

Mozart's Requiem is a masterpiece, yet cloaked in mystery, from its commission by Count Franz von Walsegg to questions about who actually completed the Requiem. It was in July 1791 that Mozart was visited by a stranger, representing a man desiring a Requiem for his recently deceased wife, and provided a 50 percent deposit and the final payment would be upon delivery of the completed piece. As Mozart was already in ill health, he believed he was writing his own

Requiem. He passed on December 5, 1791 at age 35 with some of the twelve movements incomplete. Mozart's wife, Constanze, was concerned that she would not receive the final payment if the work was submitted incomplete, and she was in desperate need of money, so she set to finding other composers to complete the work and pass off the commission as completed by Mozart. Eventually the piece was given to Franz Xaver Süssmayr, one of Mozart's students who was very familiar with Mozart's intention for the composition.

In the Darkest Hour by David Stone was composed in 2015 after the loss of his nephew who was stillborn. In the face of significant physical challenges living a life in a wheelchair following a spinal injury, his composition is full of strength and encouragement to his grieving brother. David passed in January 2024 at age 53; he was the son of Susan and Fran Stone, both members of the Festival Chorus.

The Stockbridge Festival Chorus is conducted by Tracy Wilson. Ed Lawrence will be the concert organist for the Requiem, which will also be accompanied by a trombone trio and timpani. Aaron Likness is the SFC accompanist. Soloists for the Requiem are Samantha Talora, soprano; Mary Verdi, alto; Richard Geiler, tenor; and John Demler, bass.

Palm/Passion Sunday - April 13th - 10:00 a.m.

Join the crowd to welcome Jesus as he enters Jerusalem. We will tell the full story of the week including a Palm Processional, gathering in the Upper Room for Communion and watching events unfold all the way to the cross.

Maundy Thursday - April 17th - Tenebrae/Foot Washing - 7:00 p.m.

Gather for John's account of Thursday as Jesus gathered with his disciples, washed their feet and gave them a new commandment of love. Witness service, love, prayer, betrayal, and denial. The Deacons will offer an optional foot washing experience following worship.

We take our place at the foot of the cross to bear witness to the fateful events of the trial, beating, crucifixion, and burial. We will have the chance to confess the ways we continue to betray or deny Christ. We will face truth in love.

Stations of the Cross - National Shrine of Divine Mercy (Stockbridge) - 6:30 p.m.

We meet on Eden Hill to walk the Stations. This flat course winds through the scenes from the trial to the tomb. Along the way we will use a beautiful prayer liturgy from Australia that tells the story of each station and offers a prayer. We walk it together as family and community.

Sunrise Service 6:00 a.m. - The Jonathan Edwards Room

Christ is Risen! We will gather facing the sunrise to celebrate the Easter truth of life and resurrection. A time of simple food and fellowship will follow.

With special music, the flowered cross and cries of Alleluia we will sing, pray, and celebrate! Stay after for the **Egg Hunt for children** and a time of food and fellowship.
