

Dear Church Family,

I remember being fascinated by the simple arcade game "Whack-a-Mole. Perhaps it was the different cartoonish smiling moles that popped up begging to be whacked. Perhaps it was the music that kept getting more frantic as the game went on. Perhaps it was that no matter how many moles you hit another popped up. I think we are living in a "Whack-a-Mole" time.

In conversations with you, fellow clergy, not-forprofit leaders, and denominational leadership, I hear how tired we all are, how worn thin we are. I hear people lamenting about how many issues they are facing. Grinning mole after grinning mole popping up begging to be whacked. Over time, Whack-a-Mole grew less exciting and more wearying. Perhaps it was because I came to realize I couldn't hit them all and even if I did, the music would still grow more frantic, I would grow more tired, and even when the game ended I would still see that frustrating grin.

This summer, my reading list is deep with books from people writing about these times. Through esteemed teachers like Richard Rohr, insightful observers like Ezra Klein, and amazing religious leaders like Rabbi Sharon Brous, I am beginning to gather insights and perspectives on how to not just manage these times but to find places of rest and peace amid them. Each day I also begin with beautiful writings from www.grateful.org, I encounter the poetry of Jeff Foster who invites us to just be ourselves, and I rest in the blessings of John O'Donoghue. I do so to not just react to those outward things that are affecting me but also to honor the inward challenges I bring to my encounter with the world.

I have also enjoyed recent conversations with many of you. I am grateful every time someone

forwards me a newspaper article or a song that is bringing them perspective for these days. As we explored in worship recently, hope is a communal thing that is rooted in what God has done and is doing and flourishes in our connections. Hope is that thing that keeps us from being stalled and allows us to catch a glimpse of God's long ark of goodness. Thank you.

Being in dialogue with you helps avoid the waste of time playing "Whack-a-Mole." Summers allow me a little bit more breadth to think and imagine, to plan and dream, to imagine and get ready. For me, ministry is profoundly an act that remembers from where we have come and meets us profoundly in this very moment that we might together find a future. I have a serious and literal request - I would love to hear from you. Whether we get together for a conversation or whether you write me a note or an e-mail, here is what I would like to learn from you: (1) how are you – *really*, (2) what moles are popping up in your world (whether about the broader world or your own life), and (3) what are you yearning for in our shared church life? Don't worry if you don't have those answers in complete depth or clarity the whole point, as Rachel Held Evans would remind us, is simply to get the conversation started.

Summers are a blessing. They allow me to slow down enough to find myself and to try to find the outlines of a path placed before us by the Spirit. I hope that you are hanging in there in these "Whack-a-Mole times." I hope, even more, to hear from you and to be together with you.




Beyond music, I have a lot of interests that keep me busy. I love spending time with and taking care of my family, traveling, and visiting friends.

Behind the Scenes with the Board of Trustees

Much of what the Trustees do takes place behind the scenes (investments), in the netherworld of the church basement (furnaces, plumbing), or in the imagination (long-range planning), and you may hear about it primarily when it appears as an item in the annual budget. So we wanted to share some recent developments with you.

On June 10, the installation of a new buildingwide, code-compliant, fire alarm system was completed. You may or may not have noticed a few new discreetly-placed strobe lights, but we can all enjoy an enhanced sense of security for our buildings, our congregation, and the community partners who use our space.

Helping our Community

On April 29, Central Berkshire Habitat for

Humanity was notified that their AmeriCorps grant, funded by the AmeriCorps



Agency in Washington was terminated effective immediately. The stated reason was that the award "no longer effectuates agency priorities" yet no clear criteria or warning were provided.

This devastating decision threatens not only the stability of their programs but the work of AmeriCorps workers who serve the community every day. On the local level, this termination immediately impacts eight dedicated AmeriCorps members who have been working tirelessly to build affordable homes and strengthen our neighborhoods. These individuals have committed themselves to a year of service living modestly on the small stipends provided by the AmeriCorps grant. With the sudden loss of the grant they are not only stripped of their ability to continue their service but are also facing the loss of the stipends they depend on for basic living expenses. We're also happy to share a progress report on the **solar panel** installation. The company



which will be doing the installation has inspected our roof and deemed it suitable, has obtained the necessary approval from National Grid, and is now awaiting the town permits. When this project is completed, it will be a significant win for both our church budget and our stewardship of the environment. We'll keep you posted as this important project moves along.

Stockbridge Sinfonia

For those of you who simply cannot get enough musical offerings in your lives over



the summer, here are some more things to put on your calendar, and they are free! Many of you know I conduct the Stockbridge Sinfonia in the summer, tucked in between the Winter-Spring Stockbridge Festival Chorus concerts. The Stockbridge Sinfonia was founded 53 years ago and is the Berkshires' longest running community orchestra. In fact, it was born right next door at the old Town Hall. The group is comprised of students ranging from 14 to 22 years of age, and adults, both amateur and semi-professional.

We have two sets of concerts this summer, first by members of our Wind Ensemble performing Gounod Petite Symphonie and Mozart Gran Partita. These concerts will be guest conducted by David Diggs, who has been attending our church recently with his wife, Grace. Concerts are Sat. July 12, 3 pm at Zion Lutheran Church in Pittsfield and Sun. July 13, 3 pm at Church on the Hill in Lenox.

The full Sinfonia has three concerts in August, and the series is entitled Overtures and More! We are doing the Overture from Mozart's Marriage of Figaro, Roman Carnival Overture by Berlioz and the Festival Overture by Shostakovich. We are doing a piece by local composer Joan Devoe based on her personal experience pre-during-post covid pandemic, and finishing with Dvorak Symphony No. 8. Concerts are August 2, 3 pm at Lenox Memorial Middle and High School, August 9, 3 pm at Zion Lutheran Church, and Sun August 10, 6 pm at Saint James Place in Great Barrington.

I hope to see many of you at one of the concerts.

Active Prayer of Thanksgiving Pop-Up Pantry Sunday, July 6

Suggested food/toiletry items: canned/dried beans, peanut or other nut butters, breakfast cereals/rolled oats, canned fruit/vegetables/ soups/tuna/salmon/chicken, brown rice/ quinoa/other grains, white or whole grain pasta, pasta sauce, white or whole grain flour, cornmeal, condiments, cooking oil, coffee, tea, shampoo, soap, toothpaste, paper towels.

The Pop-Up Pantry Needs Your Help!

Our Pop-Up Pantry is an important resource for those in our community facing food insecurity. Do you have 20-30 minutes once a month to re-stock our Pop-Up Pantry? Could you shop for needed pantry items? The pantry is re-stocked twice each week on Sunday or Monday and Wednesday or Thursday. Shopping is done about once a month. Re-stocking involves checking the inventory in the pantry and moving items from the closet in the back hall of the church into the pantry, tracking items used and noting on the shopping list attached to the door when supplies of items are running low. Church Picnic: Sunday, July 20 at 12:00 noon

YOU are invited to the Church Picnic at the Schneyers' beautiful gazebo with lawn sloping down to picturesque Mohawk Lake in Glendale (see map). This is a relaxed time of picnicking, fellowship, swimming, and boating for all members of our congregation – your friends and family are welcome too. <u>We're asking everyone to bring their</u> <u>own meat & buns or main dish and their own soft drinks (no alcohol)</u> —a grill will be available. <u>Please also</u> <u>bring a dish to share</u>: salad, side dish, dessert, or munchies. Condiments, paper products (plates, napkins, cups), cutlery and ice will be provided.

This is a great day to come to church dressed for a picnic. Just don't forget to pack your bathing suit, towel, sand toys, hat, sunscreen, bug repellent, and a chair or blanket. Floaties for small children are fine, but please don't bring any large rafts or boats. There are boats available at the lake. The Schneyers have a house next to the lake where we can change clothes or use the restroom, and they can drive people up and down the hill in their golf cart if needed.

Please note that parents are responsible for their own children's safety. Mohawk Lake is a private lake and our hosts kindly request no fishing, no outside boats, and no dogs. Carpooling is encouraged as parking is somewhat limited. If it rains, the rain date will be July 27. Any questions, ask Ted Randolph or Cindy Brown.
