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

Dear Church Family,

Grace and peace be unto you.

In these moments as summer ends and we prepare to return to the rhythms and routines of the fall I am acutely aware of how liminal these moments are. Liminality is defined by the Oxford dictionary both as "occupying a position at, or on both sides of, a boundary or threshold" as well as the process of transitioning through that threshold. What I love about liminality is that it is a "becoming." I love that the becoming is not just some random occurrence but a beautiful gift of living in the moment that allows for honoring the past even as we let go of it to claim a new future.

I am grateful for the many volunteers who have engaged in that process this summer. From staffing changes to program realignment, to solar panels, and even new directories, all of it has been deeply liminal and now in just a matter of days we will launch into a new program year. I am excited about the new opportunities to engage our faith, our world and each other in truth, beauty, and calling. I am filled with optimism about the road that lies before us. I hope that you are prepared to meet our spirit of liminality with your own.

As you return this fall there will be new invitations for you to engage in seemingly familiar things. You will be encouraged to engage in everything from volunteering on Sunday mornings, to being part of new studies, to adding your voice to our choir, to sharing your commitments in our community and your perspectives on worship. To be church we really do need all who can to step up and in. And yet, how we do so matters too.

Throughout the Bible, and especially in Isaiah, there is the reminder that God is making all things new. Our job is to meet God where God is at work and to partner in that recreation. It is to adopt a mindset of liminality – honoring our story, living in this moment and yet seeing this moment as being both on two sides of a threshold and the gift to move through that threshold into something new.

On Rally Sunday there will be the joy of familiarity. The choir will be there (appropriately as it too is moving into a new place), the kids will head off to Sunday School (yes in new ways), we will gather out on the lawn for food and watermelon seed spitting (with the chance to find new friends and new joy). Can we meet that day in liminality? Can we open ourselves to the joy of that moment, the memories it brings, and the chance to step into the future? I know we can and I pray we will.

The truth is every moment of our lives is liminal. Each breath is that gift that stays in tension between what has already happened and what is about to be. Our faith is a story of being open to the truth that God is still speaking, still inviting us to be apart of doing something new, offering us the chance to grow, deepen, and transform. I hope you have had a full summer and hope that you are ready to step forward into a dynamic, vibrant, beautiful new fall.


The Great Characters of the Bible

Volunteering

In Greek, the word for church is ecclesia which literally means "the gathering."

Gathering is no small matter – it is not just assembling – it is coming together on purpose for a purpose. On Sunday mornings we gather for many reasons. Some of those reasons have to do with what we each get from a Sunday morning. Other reasons though, are for what others need or for what God is calling us to do.

The truth is that on any Sunday morning we need many volunteers to allow "the gathering" to happen. We rely on volunteers to provide hospitality, both remembering the joy it brings us and also in remembrance that there are people who come on Sunday morning who desperately need to be welcomed and to feel part of a family. We rely on volunteers to help nurture and teach our children, both because we know how precious our children are and because we know that Sunday morning is maybe one of the few times parents of those children can be in a place of peace, growth, and expansion. We need volunteers to help with worship so that they might add their voice, but also so that we might hear each other's stories and be drawn closer together.

This summer, the boards of Christian education, growth and fellowship, and deacons have been working hard to revitalize our volunteer systems. They have taken the time to clarify the rules of each volunteer position so that you as a congregation might understand what we need and what we are asking for so that you can discern where you might jump in. We have worked hard on the functional systems that support volunteering. We have developed simpler ways for the whole congregation to be able to become volunteers on Sunday morning. Now all we need is for you to respond.

Shortly you will receive a mailing with descriptions of all of these roles as well as the process for how to sign up. Starting on Rally Sunday each week you will hear from a



different person in our congregation who has volunteered. They will share both why they volunteered and what they discovered in doing so. Finally, each Sunday we will have volunteers in the Jonathan Edwards room ready to answer any questions you might have and able to help sign you up for a coming date.

Each Sunday we need approximately 7 to 10 volunteers to make our gathering a reality. Those roles include outdoor greeters, ushers, liturgists, a variety of roles within Sunday School, and fellowship hour hosts too.

As a church, we gather because we know what it does for us. and we remember the gifts that others may need. We hope that you will take our invitation to heart and respond with open hearts. If you wish to speak with



anyone about the possibility of volunteering, you can always start with the chairs, Elisabeth Bellows (CE), Ted Randolph (Growth and Fellowship) or Elizabeth Young (Deacons) or by calling the church office and speaking with either Will or Brent. Thank you!

Treasurer's Budget Update

Here is the latest budget update, showing our numbers through June 30, 2025, and presented as a one-page summary. If you would like to see a full 3-page copy of the budget, please reach out to me, or to Will in the office.

Things are looking good! Our income from pledges, loose offerings, and facility use continues to be strong and in line with our budget projections. Although those numbers may look slightly low right now, there is income that has happened in July and August that aren't noted in these June numbers.

Combined with the good work of all of our Boards, we are both supporting our missions, programs, and administrative needs and staying at or below budget projections on expenses.

While it may be too early to give an exact final budget number for the year, I feel good about where we are and the projections we are starting to look at. I will continue to share financial updates, and I am also happy to provide more details, and to answer any questions you may have about our budget.
