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

Dear Church Family,

October is here. In New England, October is a great month of liminality. It would take willful stubbornness not to notice the change that comes throughout the month. The leaves literally change their colors before dropping to the ground and revealing a whole new landscape. The last vestiges of summer finally give way to the new routines of school, work, and church. The very air feels and smells different while not just the amount of light but its quality begins to change becoming weaker and warmer with golden hues and softer shadows.

In October, church life changes as we joyfully resume things like Sunday School, service, choir, study, and fellowship even as we think ahead through welcoming new members and stewardship.

What I love about liminality in general and its appearance in October in particular is its slowness. Change in October is gradual and lingering – it invites us not to a pivot but rather a reorientation, a turning. So how best to approach such a time?

A powerful suggestion emerged at our final leadership book group. Gathered around a table, eating pasta, stew, crusty bread, and salad, a group of nine explored Rabbi Sharon Brous' treasure, the amen effect- Ancient Wisdom to Mend Our Broken Hearts and World. Without question the Rabbi's advice is "show up!" Show up with your body and your heart. Show up with your challenges and bad news. Show up with your celebrations and good news. Show up bringing occasions so full of joy you can't help but dance and with those moments when all we can do is sit side by side in silence. Show up, she says so that you not only can be seen, but

that everyone in our church family knows they are seen.

On October 12th – new members will join the church including some of our youth. In the very litany of membership is the commitment not only to welcome and help them but to learn from them and allow our church to become new through them. If we are to allow that not just to be a moment of celebration but the possibility for transformation, we all need to show up. Show up to make promises with them. Show up in ways that make clear we pledge to bring our full authentic selves and only ask the same of them. Show up in ways that proclaim they are not joining our congregation, but we are becoming a whole new family, a brand-new body through their presence.

On October 19th – we will kick off our Stewardship Campaign. The theme this year is "Dreaming God's Dream." Stewardship is one way we make a commitment to this church. If we are to allow that process not to just be a way to pay our bills, but a new way to experience a faithful commitment or a way to encourage our church to live boldly, we all need to show up. We need to show up with open hearts to hear the whisper of God and the testimony of our church family. We need to show up in ways that show we are not just trying to hold on but trying to live, to thrive. We need to show up not in control but allowing Christ to show us the way.

October is a liminal time. A time of great import for each of us and our church. I hope and pray that we engage this important time slowly and gradually and most importantly by showing up. In gratitude and hope,

Stockbridge Festival Chorus

We begin rehearsals on Sunday, October 5, from 1 to 3 pm for our Christmas concert on Saturday, December 13, 3:00 pm. Berkshire Association



Let's Revive the Green Team and Work Towards Becoming a Creation Justice Church!

As our solar panels go live, what better time to revive the Green Team and re-dedicate our work to becoming a Creation Justice Church.

There are **five big reasons** why every church should want to be a Creation Justice Church:

- 1. **It's our first calling!** In the opening pages of Genesis, we learn that the first job that God gives to us humans is to care for God's creation (Genesis 2:15).
- 2. **It's what Jesus would do!** The apostle Paul spells out how Jesus sought to put right the broken covenantal relationship between God and all of creation (Romans 8:20-24).
- 3. Clean air, clean water—those are good things! If there is something that should bring together Christians in common cause, it is protecting the gifts of creation. Who doesn't want clean air and water?
- 4. It's about justice! As Christians, we seek justice—to be in right relationship with God, our neighbors, and all of creation. From racial inequities to the ongoing legacy of colonialism, creation justice is deeply intertwined with multiple matters of justice. The current climate crisis gives matters of justice utmost urgency.
- 5. It's in our DNA! The UCC's Commission for Racial Justice was the central organization in the watershed events of the environmental justice movement. It is one of the most significant parts of our denominational heritage, and every UCC church has the opportunity to continue this powerful legacy.

The UCC's Creation Justice Church program assists congregations in making the ministry of environmental justice an integral strand in the DNA of their faith community. The first step in this process is to create a 'Green Team,' a group within our church dedicated to promoting and implementing sustainable practices to reduce our environmental impact. The Green



Team will work to achieve various sustainability goals, such as reducing waste and conserving energy and water. It will also promote sustainable behavior in the members of our congregation and develop programs to educate people on environmental issues.

And it is good!






